As I drive to work now I see a small portion of the flooding that has swamped, literally, many places of SW Michigan. Church members have dealt with water locally, one family forced to leave their home as utilities were shut off, and neighboring communities have suffered even worse. Niles has now become a site where Presbyterian Disaster Assistance is working to bring relief. Pastor Fran Lane-Lawrence has said almost every family in the Niles area is affected by the flooding one way or another. This makes the small amount of water that has seeped into our basement so small as to be insignificant. I urge your prayers and support for our neighbors and friends as they seek to dry out and recover.

In addition to local flooding, our nation continues to reel from the acts of violence being committed across our country. As I wrestle personally with better ways to prevent such actions, I find myself in the same crunch between personal freedoms/rights and the need for personal and community safety that our legislators face. One area where my opinions have become crystal clear is the area of health where some individuals are determined to be a threat to themselves or others. There needs to be some way that still respects privacy where such information can flag and stop a purchase of a weapon which could be used to end lives. I invite you to join me in prayer for the victims, their families and friends, and for all who can influence our country to a safer, healthier future.

The season of Lent through which we are now living is a journey. As Jesus walked toward Jerusalem, knowing the cost He would have to pay for our sin, we are encouraged to walk into lives of deeper trust and faithfulness to our loving God. While you may have removed some items as a 'temporary fast', I encourage you to add in additional times for listening to God in prayer, for reading and meditating on God's Word (your favorite Bible passages are a great place to start), and perhaps add a biography of a faithful Christian to your reading list. While I still turn to some of my favorites during lent, people like C. S. Lewis and Thomas a Kempis, I'm currently reading a book by John Ortberg entitled *God Is Closer Than You Think*. Full of good storytelling, this book challenges thinking while providing resources for growing Christians. I hope and pray I never stop growing closer to God in Christ Jesus, and I desire the same for all of you.

May our great and loving God richly bless you through these often wet and changing days of late winter as we yearn for the warmth and joy of spring. In all seasons, in all conditions, to God be the glory, now and forever!

Greetings to all from 2. Chronicles 5:12-14

"All the Levitical singers, Asaph, Heman, and Jeduthun, their sons, and their kinsmen, attired in fine linen, stood with cymbals lutes and lyres to the east of the altar, together with a 120 priests who blew trumpets. Now the trumpeters and the singers joined in unison to sound forth praise and thanksgiving to the Lord, and the song was raised with trumpets, cymbals and musical instruments, in praise of the Lord, because 'it is good, for his love endures forever'; and the house was filled with the cloud of the glory of the Lord. The priests could not continue to minister because of the cloud, for the glory of the Lord filled the house of God."

The Chancel Choir will resume its rehearsals on February 28 and participate regularly in our worship services from March through July.

Here is an interesting article about a well-known hymn "When I Survey the Wondrous Cross" (#101 in our church hymnal) adopted from Randy Petersen's book "Be Still My Soul."

The Apostle Paul had a lot to brag about, and he did brag sometimes, but not for long. In Philippians 3 he produces his credentials – good pedigree, a master of religion, a keeper of God's law – but then he trashes it: "Whatever were gains to me I now consider loss for the sake of Christ (Philippians 3:7). In another letter he says explicitly, "May I never boast about anything except the cross of our Lord Jesus Christ" (Galatians 6:14).

That's the attitude Isaac Watts presents in this hymn: "My richest gain I count but loss." Watts himself was a brash young man who often complained about the church's stuffy psalm-singing. His father apparently asked Isaac whether he thought he could write something better, and young Isaac did just that, churning out a new paraphrase of a psalm each week for a couple of years.

The precocious youth turned into a prolific adult. Many of his hymns were drawn from the Psalms, but this one is simply a Communion hymn. It appeared in his 1707 collection, when Watts was just 33. Some different tunes have been attached to it, but Lowell Mason's "Hamburg," written in 1824 and based on Gregorian plainsong, has had the longest-lasting connection.

If Isaac Watts were still around to hear the accolades for this hymn, he would probably have enjoyed them. He had taken his father's "challenge" and won. But then he would remember that his richest gain was still a loss, compared to the greatness of knowing Christ.

May God bless us all, grant us protection, guidance, good health, prosperity and an opportunity to

be a blessing to others.

MONTHLY REPORT OF THE PNC - FEBRUARY 21, 2018

Since the congregation elected the Pastor Nominating Committee (PNC) in late January, the team of six has been busy building up momentum. As you know, the six members are Chris Corbitt, Leslie Gilreath, J. Michael Hall, John Kauffman, Jenna McAllister and Robert Smith. Leslie was appointed chair, and I volunteered to be the secretary. We will keep you informed of our progress -- though any hiring process must be highly confidential.

In early February we received training from our Transition Counselor, the Reverend Sarah Schmidt-Lee from Kalamazoo. The following week we met with Session and received our marching orders. February 20 was our first official meeting directed toward preparing the Ministry Information Form (MIF). Our timeline for preparation of this document, to alert pastors to our search for a new spiritual leader, is a tight 30-day window. The form must be approved by Session at its March meeting and then by Lake Michigan Presbytery's Committee on Ministry, which we hope to see just before Easter.

We are basing our writing decisions not only on prayers and deliberation but also upon recent work by the congregation. This includes the surveys you filled out, the all-day Visioning Workshop in November, and the Conversation on Visioning held in December. ONE GREAT HOUR OF SHARING

Did you know that our congregation had one of the top giving rates per member in our Presbytery last year? On Easter Sunday, April 1, we will be receiving the One Great Hour of Sharing offering. Please use your offering envelope that will be provided in your bulletin on Easter Sunday.

Around the world, millions of people lack access to sustainable food sources, clean water, sanitation, education and opportunity. The three programs supported by One Great Hour of Sharing are Presbyterian Disaster Assistance, the Presbyterian Hunger Program and Self-Development of People.

- 1. Presbyterian Disaster Assistance works alongside communities as they recover and find hope after the devastation of natural or human-caused disasters and support for refugees and receives 32% of funds raised.
- 2. Presbyterian Hunger Program takes action to alleviate hunger, care of creation, and the systemic causes of poverty so all may be fed and receives 36% of the funds raised.
- 3. Self-Development of People invests in communities responding to their experiences of oppression, poverty and injustice and educates Presbyterians about the impact of these issues and receives 32% of funds raised.

TECHNOLOGY UPDATE

We have experienced some technical difficulties with the startup of the new streaming of the church's worship service. Wrinkles are always anticipated when dealing with technology. Thankfully we have Bill Cundiff and his expertise to help iron them out. We also have done some upgrading to our internet service to help with the uploading speed of the streaming to the internet, which should help.

Here is how you get to the streaming link.

On your web browser (Internet Explorer, Google, Chrome, Firefox, etc.) in the URL line type in front of the https://www.fairplainpc.com. This will take you to the church's website. Click on the Steaming-Live & Recorded tab. On that page you will see the first line which says "Streaming will start 9:20 am with audio at 9:25 am." NOTE: If you start the streaming BEFORE 9:20 am, you will only see the SPLASH screen of the church with "Sorry, the live streaming is offline now." You will need to close out and come back in at the correct time, no sooner than 9:20 am.

To start Live Streaming click on the link, "//iframe.dacast.com..." that is below the line that reads "Click on the below link to start streaming Sunday's <u>Live Service</u>." It may take a few seconds for the upload to connect. Be patient.

If you wish to view the recorded church service at a later time and/or date, you can go to the next line that says, "Click on below link to view <u>Recorded Sunday services</u>." Click on the link below the date that you want to watch.

We hope this will be an outreach to our church members and non-members that are homebound, the snow birds, and anyone that is new moving into the community. This will also give any pastors that may be interested in our church as we begin the search for a new pastor, a view into our church and its current worship service.
