Dear friends,

I usually put a scripture passage at the top of my newsletter articles, but this month wanted to draw your attention to this ideal in the poem inscribed at the base of the Statue of Liberty. As I sailed past her on the Staten Island Ferry a few weeks ago, I remembered this poem. I couldn't even read it later without choking up.

The Bible has a lot to say about how God's people are called to treat non-citizens in their land. Emma Lazarus' poem reflects God's commands and represents some of our highest ideals as a country. "The New Colossus" follows the biblical imperatives about how we are called to treat those seeking refuge within our borders.

Unfortunately, our country today is not living up to these lofty ideals. Instead of the mighty woman with a torch named Mother of Exiles, the huddled masses yearning to breathe free meet impossibly long waits, often months of homelessness waiting for the right to even *approach* a port of entry. Small children are separated from their parents and packed into buildings with concrete floors and separated by chain link fences, denied soap, dry towels, showers, toothbrushes, protection from cold, and dry clothes. This is inexcusably wicked behavior toward anyone, especially children, many of whose only crime is seeking safety with their parents in the United States.

I know much of this situation is not new or particular to the current administration, and I know *good* solutions will be difficult and hard-fought, but I also know in my bones that this current "solution" is abominable, and its stench goes up before the LORD of Hosts. Please pray with me that our elected representatives will quickly find and enforce a way to keep our border secure without so vilely abusing those the Bible calls the people of God to protect: the most vulnerable.

CLERK'S CORNER

We lost **Lynette Burchard** on May 24, 2019 as she entered the church Triumphant. She will be missed. And just last month I wrote about how she and Lew helped clean the refrigerator in the Fellowship Hall. Our church membership now stands at 88 members with the death of Lynnette, and the removal of **Marcia and Rocky DeFrancesco** from our membership as requested by letter. In May, 40 worshipers were served communion, and average attendance was 42 for the month.

It's official. **Ronnie Zanella** has been accepted by the University of Nebraska - Lincoln to pursue his doctorate degree in choral conducting. His last week here will be Sunday, July 28. His outstanding preludes and postludes will be missed, as well as his personality. The Personnel Committee, with leadership from **Ernie Lewis**, will do our best to find an outstanding replacement.

Last Sunday Fred Welch, President of the Corporation of Fairplain Presbyterian Church, informed us of some of the work of Session. We have had comments and questions from members about the deterioration of the soffit, cornice and Fascia of our Sanctuary. The building is 65 years old and the wood up there is a bit difficult to power wash and paint on a regular basis, and as a result there is quite a bit of rotting. The food pantry addition is only 20 years old, but there is also quite a bit of rotting in that part of that building. We had about ten feet of that repaired last fall thanks to the generosity of Nan and Augie Meyer, and it stopped the leaking in the office area of the food pantry.

We have requested that if you folks decide to replace it, that we do it with PVC wood-like materials. That way they would never need to be repainted, perhaps power washed just to look clean. I hear plastic is expected to stick around for 500 years.

We are also looking at **replacing the 55-year-old boiler** that heats the education wing of the building. We can no longer get replacement parts for the boiler, and the man who came to give us a quote made the statement that the boiler is now used up. **Sunday June 30**, we will have an informational question and answer in the Courtyard room after worship. On **Sunday July 21**, we will have a Meeting of the Corporation in the Sanctuary immediately following the worship service.

On Saturday, **September 14**, we are going to **host the meeting of the Presbytery**! We will need lots of volunteers host up to 150 people for the day, and include breakfast and lunch. Keep in mind, you do not have to be here all day. You can volunteer for any small part at any time of the day.

Volunteers needed to host the Presbytery meeting:

Parking attendants: We will need 3 or 4 people to wear bright vests and direct parking.

Five to six hosts to greet people

Registration tables: We will need three registration tables (A--M) and (N-Z) and several people to "man" or "woman" these tables. Along with the registration tables, one where we can collect lunch money. We need additional tables that can be placed nearby to contain formation that needs to be distributed.

Breakfast: Muffins or pastries, coffee, decaf, tea, water – We need help preparing and serving.

Lunch: We will need to offer a vegetarian option and be able to accommodate special requests- lunch can be anything we want to serve. We don't want lunch to exceed one hour, so simple is good. Lunch costs are usually \$8.00 per person. That gives us a budget with which to work.

Leaving Bags: A small paper lunch sack that contains a bottle of water, and some kind of snack for the ride home. Our presbytery includes an area from Cadillac to Jackson so some people are traveling quite a ways since we are sitting in the corner of the state. Those can be prepared by someone at home and then brought to the church.

Communion Served: Bread must be gluten free and we provide the servers of Deacons and Elders.

Offering Collected: Four people

This hopefully gives you an idea of what we need in order to host a meeting of Presbytery. Talk to Leslie Gilreath or Marlene Smith if you have questions or to volunteer!
