Dear friends,

It's October already, the time of Pumpkin Spice Everything, crisper weather, pumpkin carving, haunted houses, ghosts, witches and wizards, and Halloween. When I was growing up, my six siblings and I dressed up for "Trick-or-treat!" night and waltzed through the four streets of Hostetter collecting candy from our neighbors. It was fun.

Later, my family attended a church that taught that Halloween is the devil's holiday. (They had "harvest festivals" instead). We learned that celebrating Halloween, reading books like *Harry Potter*, and playing games like Dungeons and Dragons taught witchcraft and were like inviting Satan or demons into your heart.

But Satan isn't that powerful. Once when I was preaching at a homeless shelter, the men kept talking about all the things the devil was doing in their lives. I finally asked, "Could we stop giving glory to the devil?" Pentecostal evangelist Smith Wigglesworth said one night he woke up to a powerful sense of evil in his room. He looked around and saw the devil himself at the foot of his bed. Then he said, "Oh, it's only you," and went back to sleep.

I think many people over-sell the power of the devil and his minions with relation to "creepy stuff." As beloved children of God, we need not fear Satan, only trust in God.

On the other hand, I Peter 5:8 warns that our adversary the devil prowls about like a roaring lion seeking someone to devour. It's important to be aware of that, to some extent: there are evil powers in the world trying to destroy us.

But these powers don't usually look suspicious. They don't look like role-playing games or books about witches and wizards. They look like reasonable-sounding arguments for why others aren't *really* fully human – at least not like we are, and why it's okay to treat them badly: they deserve it. Perhaps they broke a law or something. These evil powers don't sound like a fantasy role-playing game; they sound like our own voices in our own heads, filling out a long list of all the reasons we're not good enough and should just give up.

Christians have nothing to fear from costumes and trick-or-treating or fantasy books or games; God is more powerful than the devil. If we simply love God and love our neighbors, the devil won't be able to get a foothold.

CLERK'S CORNER

There has been, and continues to be, lots of excitement around Fairplain Presbyterian Church. The Presbytery of Lake Michigan meeting went off without any problems because we had about 40 members all working to make the day a success. Leslie, as the organizer of that day, has written in this newsletter about the meeting.

By the time you read this newsletter, you should have received a letter about the Capital Campaign, along with a pledge card. I encourage you to prayerfully consider how you can help with this project. The renovations are continuing. You can see the beautiful parking lot, and by the time you get this newsletter, our new boiler should be installed and ready to heat the building for the winter. Since it will have 96% efficiency, compared to the 50% efficiency of the old boiler, I'm hoping to see a reduction in our gas bill each month. I'll let you know. The soffit, fascia and cornice work is about 2/3 complete at this point. We have had a few distractions with weather and vandalism, but Ron, and Judy, his assistant, continue to make progress.

We have some new lights on the outside of the sanctuary on the west side of the building. They come on at dusk and go off at dawn. They light up the area enough to land a plane, according to Fred Welch. Do you remember David's sermon -- where he told the story about a worker who was working on the asphalting of the parking lot? The worker thought we had just purchased the building, and were fixing it up because he thought the building had been closed for several years. No one is going to think we are closed when they see this place at night. Now we just have to become proactive at inviting people to join us in worship!

Our membership stands at 90 members as of 9-19-19. The average attendance for August was 41 people in worship, and communion was served to 36 on August 4.

Be sure to put October 19, on your calendar of events to attend. The Game Night is an opportunity to be with people in the church in a different way than sitting with them each Sunday, or even during coffee hour. Invite neighbors or friends to come with you.
