Dear friends,

As the Fourth of July rolls around, I am reminded of one of my old favorite songs by the band Brooks and Dunn titled "Only in America." It celebrates the myriad ways that this country is a place where anyone can become or do anything they want if they only put their minds and / or muscles behind it. I grew up believing I could accomplish anything I set my mind to, and it has worked out well for me.

I also remember sitting in our predominantly-African-American church as a teenager watching Dr. Martin Luther King Jr.'s "I have a dream" speech. I was so proud of my country for living up to his vision and creating a world where people were judged not by the color of their skin but by the content of their character.

Only in college did I realize that my experience of equality in America was not universal. A friend posted on Facebook that a police car slowed down driving by him and he was afraid he might be arrested for "Walking While Black." I looked up "Walking While Black" on the internet and was horrified to learn Black Americans are often stopped by police while doing nothing wrong. This has never happened to me.

In seminary, I met others who experienced a different America than I did. A pastor friend was pulled over by Pittsburgh police for being a Black man driving a nice car in a poor neighborhood. Black friends told me stories about people *I knew* who always treated me with kindness and consideration, but who treated my Black friends differently than they treated me, with no difference I could see other than the color of their skin. Stories of being followed in stores, of things I never imagined happened here.

I was further horrified to learn that even though I hate racism, I have unconscious racial bias. I remember walking in Pittsburgh at night and seeing Black men on the sidewalk and feeling myself become afraid. Here in Benton Harbor, when a Black man at a gas station tried to call me over to his car to ask me something one evening, I assumed he wanted money. That was wrong.

Friends, these are hard times for people who look like me. Our country is facing a moral reckoning over centuries of harm done to Black and Brown bodies, and over the fact that some of those horrific abuses still continue to this day – usually in less obvious ways than the Minneapolis police officer who suffocated George Floyd for 8 minutes and 46 seconds.

It can be easy to fall into the trap of "white guilt," feeling guilty for things we haven't done, or even things we have done, rather than doing the work of God of fighting racism in our country, our cities, and, most perniciously, in our own hearts.

It can also be easy to fall into denial, convincing ourselves that the countless instances of raciallymotivated bad behavior only reflect a few bad apples, rather than the pattern of systemic racial disparities our Black and Brown brothers and sisters in Christ are experiencing.

As our country continues into this moral reckoning, I would encourage us all to work hard to listen to the experiences of Black and Brown Americans, even those whose experiences suggest that this country we love may not treat everyone else as kindly as it treats us. Please pray with me that our country will be face its original sin and do justice for Black and Brown Americans.

MIDLAND FLOODING

Volunteers with Presbyterian Disaster Assistance "have been on board from the start," says the Rev. Dr. Dan Saperstein, executive presbyter of the Presbytery of Lake Huron. He says that the Rev. Cully Culpepper (a PLM) is part of the PDA national deployment team assigned to the crisis.

Rev. Saperstein says he has not yet learned about requests for any work crews or other teams to help support the recovery effort.

But he does suggest three ways to provide support right now:

- Donate funds via PDA using the "Midwest Flood" Account # 000191. Go to <u>https://pda.pcusa.org/</u> to do this online.
- Donate funds directly through the Presbytery of Lake Huron. Go to <u>http://www.presbylh.org/</u> and then click the "Donate to Flood Relief" flag.
- Donate to the Food Bank of Eastern Michigan, and designate the funds be directed to the flood-affected areas. (A major problem with both the flooding and the coronavirus crisis is food insecurity.) Go to https://www.fbem.org/ to make a donation.

GREAT FAMILY NEWS! My wife Branka just competed her online Bachelor of Science Degree in Nursing! She did it in just over 2 years while working 80% as a Registered Nurse. Here GPA (Grade Point Average) in nursing courses was 4.0. Branka learned a lot and became skillful in writing about issues in nursing as well as in verbal and Power Point presentations. It was a win-win situation. Now she feels more knowledgeable and confident as a nurse. She will now be able to have much more free time and be active in other personal and family projects.

Here is an interesting article about a well-known hymn **"Crown Him with Many Crowns"** (# 151 in our church hymnal) adopted from Randy Petersen's book "Be Still My Soul."

There were times in British history when Catholics and Protestants were killing one another. The Anglican (or English) Reformation of the 1500s stirred some vicious rivalries, which continued to explode in the 1600s. By 1800s, most of the violence had blown over, but Anglican writer Matthew Bridges carried on a war of words. At age 28 he published and anti-Catholic book intended to expose "the real origin of certain papal superstitions."

Bridges also put out other, less volatile, collections of poetry and hymns, but 20 years later a strange thing happened: he converted to Catholicism. And shortly after that, he wrote 6 stanzas of this hymn, which he originally called "The Song of the Seraphs."

The text was based on Revelation 19:12, with its apocalyptic vision of Jesus as 'Faithful and True," the rider of the white horse, on whose head 'were many crowns." A few verses earlier, he is called the Lamb, and a few verses before that is the biblical version of the Hallelujah Chorus. This is the "heavenly anthem" that inspired Matthew Bridges.

In 1874 another writer entered the picture. Godfrey Thring, an Anglican, had some problems with what he saw as too much Catholicism in this hymn. One of the original verses hailed Jesus as "the virgin's son" and "fruit of the mystic rose" – tame language by modern standards, but enough to inspire Thring to write his own 6 stanzas. He also wanted to add more emphasis on Jesus' resurrection – supplying the verse about "the Lord of life, who triumphed o'er the grave." (That stanza ends in one of the great lines of hymnody – "who died eternal life to bring, and lives that death may die.")

In the ensuing years, churches and publishers sifted the 12 stanzas down to 6 or 4, using some from each writer. Thrings' "Lord of life" verse is generally included. The "Lord of years" and "Lord of love" stanzas, as well as the first, come from Bridges.

Fast-forward another 30 years or so to the early 1900s. The hymn, in various forms, is now well-known. The British and Foreign Bible Society is celebrating its 100th anniversary. At the gala occasion in London's Royal Albert Hall, congratulations are received from princes and presidents worldwide. But the moderator knows who holds the true authority. "Now that we have read these addresses from earthly rulers," he says, "let us turn our mind to the King of kings. We will sing -"Crown Him with Many Crowns."

May God richly bless and protect all of us and our loved ones during this summer. May we experience joy in serving God and others wherever we will be.
