"...when you fast, put oil on your head and wash your face, so that your fasting may be seen not by others but by your Father who is in secret, and your Father who sees in secret will reward you. -Matthew 6:16-18

Dear friends,

Have you ever turned down your car radio so you could see better? Or closed your eyes to hear better, or to savor the flavor of what you're eating or drinking?

I've been thinking about the connection between Easter and Lent: Why do many Christians fast, or give something up for Lent, in preparation for Easter?

I also wanted to know more about fasting in general. Fasting is not only a Christian thing – Muslims fast for Ramadan; Mormons fast the first Sunday of every month; Jews fast six days per year; and even before Columbus came to the Americas, people here fasted. And fasting isn't only refraining from all food; it could also be refraining from certain kinds of foods, or only eating at certain times of the day. For a couple years, my fast was logging off Facebook.

I read a CNN article that suggested one reason humans have fasted for millennia is to draw our attention to spiritual things. Our bodies and souls are tightly intertwined, so changing how we interact with something we contact as often as food can be a constant reminder, like a string tied around our hearts, to pay attention to God, to God's work in the world, and to our neighbors.

John Calvin thought regular fasting might appease God's wrath, but if you've heard enough of my sermons, you probably already know I don't believe God maintains a posture of anger with us humans in the first place. I don't believe anything we do, including fasting, could make God love us more, or less. I also don't believe fasting is a way to draw God's attention to us, like some kind of hunger strike, though many people in scripture seemed to think it worked that way. It seems to me that fasting a tool to draw *our* attention back to *God*.

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So how does this connect to Easter? If Lent tunes our hearts into a reality beyond what we can see with our eyes, hear with our ears, and taste with our mouths, then when Easter arrives, our hearts will be better tuned to sense God's grace.

Now, if you didn't give up food for Lent, that's perfectly fine; we can draw our attention to spiritual things in many ways. If you did not give *anything* up for Lent, perhaps because (like me) you forgot, that's okay too; and there's no rule that says Lent is the only time we can "turn down the radio" to pay extra attention to our souls, to God, and to our neighbors.

The highlight of this spring will be our Easter Sunday on April 09. On that day we are planning a rich music program. I have invited several volunteer musicians to join our choir to celebrate Jesus' resurrection that happened almost 2000 years ago. Everyone in the congregation is welcome to be present and bring family and friends.

Another interesting event this spring will be Vladimir's Student Recital on Sunday, May 07 at 5:00 pm. His piano, guitar and voice students will be performing a variety of compositions and styles. All are welcome to support young musicians. For some of them it will be the very first public performance ever as soloists.

Here is an interesting article about Georg Frederick Handel (1685-1759) who composed the following songs found in our church hymnal: # 40, 59, 122, 167, 249, 556. It is adapted from a quality book "Devotions from the World of Music" by Patrick & Barbara Kavanaugh.

PART ONE

On February 11 1697, Georg Handel died – But not George Frederick Handel, one of history's greatest composers. It was his father, a "surgeon-barber" at the court of Weissenfels, in Saxony (today's province of Germany).

Handel Senior disliked anything musical – he considered music-loving a sign of weakness! – and discouraged his son whenever possible. No one even knows how the young Handel taught himself to play the organ and clavier. His sympathetic mother helped him smuggle a spinet into the attic, covering the strings with stripes of cloth so that Dad would not hear any practicing.

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At the age of 7, George Junior happened to perform for the duke (his father's boss), and so pleased his audience that his father was all but ordered to find a music teacher. At 11 he played so well for the electoral highness in Berlin that they offered to send him to Italy for further study. His outraged father canceled those plans.

Why such opposition? George Senior had long since decided that his son was to be a lawyer. He had pushed so long and hard for it that even 5 years after his death, George Junior (age 17 at that time) entered the University of Halle as a law student, putting off his musical studies. Handel's father was so blinded by his expectations that he could not see his son's incredible talent that should have been obvious – and was to everyone else.

It's light until almost 8:00 these days, so consider joining us for the **Lenten Study** every **Tuesday at 5:30** for a potluck, video and discussion to follow. The videos have been good, thought provoking, and good discussions.

We have 48 active members and several non-members who are active in our church family. For the month of February, we had 45 as an average attendance in person and streaming attendance. Three homebound were served communion.

On Sunday **April 30**, Nancy and Tom Rach, two of the missionaries we have supported for several years with their work in Mexico, will be here to talk to us during our worship time. They have not visited our church for about 5 years, so I hope you can either be here in person, or stream that Sunday. When they come to the U.S.A. they try to visit different churches each year. This year is our turn.

Speaking of missionaries...This year our budget had to be trimmed by \$16,500, and one of the items that was trimmed was our overseas missionaries. We contribute to three groups, The **Rachs** in Mexico, the **Callisons** in Iraq, and the **Frontier Fellowship**. Combined, we give them \$5000. I am hoping that you might be able to contribute throughout the year so that we can continue to support the work of these missionaries. If you are willing and able to contribute small amounts from time to time, just mail them to the church office.

On May 7, we are going to have a **Hymn-sing Sunday**. If there is a hymn you would like to sing, please call, or e-mail your request to Pastor David by the last Sunday of April, the 23rd. If we have it in our collection of recorded music, it will be added. Since about a third of our hymnal is recorded, there's a good chance the hymn you want is available.
