Dear friends,

We find ourselves in that awkward time between Christmas and Epiphany and Lent. It's called "Ordinary Time" on the church calendar, which has more to do with counting ("ordinal") than with commonness. It's a time in between times. It's a time when we cross dates off our calendars, not the date that's circled.

It is that time of year C.S. Lewis described as "Always winter, and never Christmas." All our neighbors have taken down their Christmas lights, but February looms long, and I saw a post updating the "Thirty Days Hath September" poem with a joke that January has six thousand, one hundred and eighty-four days.

Even Valentine's Day this year is on Ash Wednesday, of all days, which seems appropriate somehow. One of my college friends used to call Valentine's "Singles Awareness Day," and dress in black on it in protest.

For some of us, this is also an awkward in-between time in our lives - after something beautiful, but before whatever spring we're looking forward to, or whatever next challenge we're anticipating.

I am not Joel Osteen enough to say that "a good attitude can change everything;" sometimes one's attitude is exactly that which cannot be changed, and as one disability rights activist observed, "a positive attitude is not going to change that set of stairs into a ramp," but at the same time, I think there are still things we can do to make the in-between time more bearable. Maybe even beautiful.

Kristen and I have left up our Christmas decorations. We usually take them down on Epiphany, but this year, we doubled down on leaving bright, colorful lights up: 5 days after Epiphany, I hung up two more strings of lights over our living room and dining room, and I felt very good about it. It brings me joy every time I think about it. I intend to keep them up at least until Daylight Saving Time begins.

Friends, it still gets dark so early this time of year, even as the days begin to get longer, and so many of our days are cloudy and dark that we need to take our joy where we can get it. Don't let people tell you that you need to put away what makes you happy because it's not in season, or not popular, or whatever excuse they want to use to steal your joy.

I'm feeling like maybe there is a light at the end of this cold and ice tunnel that we have been experiencing. It's a balmy 33 degrees this morning! The good news is that I have been able to completely construct two quilt tops and cut out the pieces and plan for two more quilts. I feel quite productive. Turns out I enjoyed being shut in for a few weeks.

More good news. Due to the generosity of you folks, we have been able to meet two of our overseas mission goals which were not a part of the general church budget this year! We were able to send our missionaries in the Middle East, \$2000, and the Rach's in Mexico, \$1,500. Thank you so much for helping to support the important work that these folks do in far-off places. Check in our Annual Report and read the mission report for more specifics.

Speaking of Annual report. Our Annual Congregational meeting will be held February 11, 2024, in the Courtyard Room, immediately following the worship service. We will vote on the Terms of Call and elect a Nominating Committee. Please try to be in person that day if possible. We will be streaming the meeting too, so you can join by Google Meet.

Pastor David has proposed a Lenten study called "Practical Prayers" by Sacred Calls. Session voted to have the Lenten study in place of Sunday School to be held on:

Jan. 28 - Feb.11 - Feb. 25 - Mar. 10 - Mar. 17. - Mar. 24

This will take place in the Courtyard after worship on those Sundays. The study will also be on Google Meet so those who cannot be present in person can join us on line.

Again, we need to thank our Mishkan Daviyd friends for their help in fixing the spigots on the old bathroom sinks. They have replaced parts in most of the sinks, and two faucets will have to be completely replaced. It appears that old internal parts of our spigots were able to turn themselves on with water pressure, and let water run unabated. Thank you from all of us as we are able to experience lower water and gas bills thanks to hot water not running.

Currently we have 42 active members. Communion was served to 19 in worship and to 4 at home. Average attendance for December was 54 with both in-person and streaming.

The following music groups enriched our Sunday Worship experience in January:

January 07 – Chancel Choir (Introit and 2 songs)

January 14 – No Church Service – Snow day

January 21 – Chancel Choir and Family Slavujevic Chimes, Bells and Voices

January 28 – The Praise Team "Wherever Two ..." (2 songs)

Rarely do we have to cancel our church service due to inclement weather. This happened on Sunday, January 14. A new volunteer lady guest musician was scheduled to perform two songs. Hopefully the weather will cooperate on February 25 when she will share her vocal talent with us.

Even though our choir has regular rehearsals every other Sunday before and after the church service, we met on Saturday afternoon, January 27 for a two-hour extra practice. Our goal is to meet every 2 months in order to learn new songs.

On weekends Michael Hall and I continue to record tenor and bass sections for all our choir songs. I am grateful that we have modern technology that he and Pastor David know how to use for the benefit of our choir sound. We use pre-recorded music done by our previous church pianists, by myself as well as some commercial soundtracks.

Here is an interesting article about a well-known hymn "Fairest Lord Jesus" (# 306 in our church hymnal) adopted from Randy Petersen's quality book "Be Still My Soul."

In the year 1095, Pope Urban II rallied the Christians of Europe to take up arms and free Jerusalem from its Muslim captors. "God wills it!" he declared, and that became the rallying cry for this first Crusade. Over the next 2 centuries there were 8 Crusades, each one headed toward the Holy Land to take or re-take sacred sites, to punish the "infidels," or to stroke the egos of certain leaders. There is much to criticize about these efforts. We can legitimately question whether the Crusaders were interpreting God's will correctly. And yet, according to one tradition, this gorgeous song was first sung by a group of Germans marching off to join these wars. Even now, it is often called "The Crusader's Hymn."

In 1415, a Bohemian priest named Jan Hus was burned at the stake, not only for teachings the church considered heretical, but also for political reasons. His idea about personal faith and the rights of individual believers laid the groundwork for the Protestant Reformation. After his death, a group of his followers continued to meet together, often in secret – and when they gathered, they sang. Another tradition suggests that "Fairest Lord Jesus" originated in these meetings.


We know that the German text of this song first appeared in print in 1677 in a hymnal produced by Jesuits. Thus some scholars say the verses were composed in the early 1600s by these German Catholics. Though the tune was not printed until 1842, it's generally accepted that it dates back to at least the 1600s, and maybe much earlier, a common folk song in the region of Silesia (which is now Polish, Czech, and German territory). It has had a couple of different arrangements and translations into English. In some hymnals it is called "Beautiful Savior."

So what are we to make of this winding history? Maybe the words themselves can give us a clue. It's obviously a meditative song, a love note to a Lord we are crazy about. As beautiful as creation is, Jesus outshines it. We rightly cherish and honor Him above all else.

But the competing legends about this song alert us to the danger of cherishing *our ideas* of Jesus more than Jesus himself. Sometimes we get the idea that Christian faith just means fighting for Team Jesus, when it really means doing what He said. The Prince of Peace told us to love our neighbors – and our *enemies*! So how can you sing this love song on your march to annihilate your foe?

May God bless us all abundantly, grant us protection, guidance, good health, prosperity, and an opportunity to be a blessing to others.
